# A Story of Lives Changed

"In Honduras People in rural communities rely on unprotected sources. The rural populace, which does not have access to improved water facilities and infrastructures, is forced to rely on small springs and wells that are not protected. This reliance on natural water sources means that access to water for the rural populace can be difficult during the dry season." (The Borgen Project)

Various factors contribute to this problem of lack of clean water, such as deforestation and the rapidly growing population in cities. In many areas, not only the rural ones, entire neighborhoods will only receive rationed water supplies **twice a week**.





Because of the lack of access to improved water purifying facilities and infrastructures, as mentioned above, the more rural populace is forced to utilize small springs, rivers and wells that are not safe and often carry various microscopic, but still very harmful, worms and bacteria.

HNH began to provide a home water filtration system a couple of years ago to help with this major problem affecting the people of Honduras, and it is such a blessing to be able to share this story today.

On a recent visit to the Piedra de Afilar village, Felix was delivering some of these water filtration systems. One of the village leaders approached Felix to express his gratitude, and he made the remarkable comment, "The children in the village don't get sick with diarrhea anymore! They hardly ever have to

visit the center for GI problems like they used to."

Thanks to the water filtration systems providing them safe, clean water to drink, the children are happier and healthier.

That's why we do what we do, and it's thanks to your support that we are able to continue to provide those filtration systems, and in turn, clean water to many of those in need.

#### A Look Back Into 2021

Despite being in the middle of the pandemic crisis and not having mission teams running brigades, **HNH staff has continued our work in Honduras.** Thanks to your support, HNH was able to bless many children and families with clean water, medical supplies, food, and so much more.

Here are some examples of the impact we have had in the lives of those in need in the past year.

- 128 mothers and 308 children received care from our Mobile Nutritional Center
- 719 medical consultations
- 455 dental consultations
- 51 organizations and public clinics received medicines donations from HNH





- -13 organizations received
  Personal Protection equipment
  (PPE)
- 11,425 *people* received food donations
- More than 600 people now have better environment at home with the concrete floor
- More than 700 people have safe water though the new filtration systems
- And many more!!
